## Reading, Literacy and Subject-Specific Vocabulary

Reading and understanding musical notation underpins the music curriculum. We believe that having good musical literacy enables young people to access and ultimately enjoy and appreciate all types of music when involved in listening, performing and composing. Musical keywords are used throughout music lessons with a focus on the elements of music when explaining music. Students regularly read about artists, ensembles and styles of music in lessons to give broader understanding of the music studied in lessons.

## **Beyond the Curriculum**

Students have access to a range of extracurricular activities such as choir, chamber choir, orchestra and musical production. Students have the opportunity to perform in two musical 'showcases' each year, a Christmas carol service, numerous whole school assemblies, year group church services, Sports day and end of year celebration events. One-to-one Instrumental and vocal music tuition is available (piano, drums, cello, brass, violin, guitar, woodwind and voice). Due to our links with South Tyneside music hub, students have the opportunity to attend performances by professional musicians for example 'Different Voices' in Y7. They have also worked in smaller workshops with percussionist Chris Bradley. Many homework tasks encourage students to widen their musical experiences by watching or listening to longer performances.
